

Minnesota Ryan White HIV/AIDS Program
Service Area Standards: Mental Health Services

HRSA Definition: Mental Health Services are the provision of outpatient psychological and psychiatric screening, assessment, diagnosis, treatment, and counseling services offered to clients living with HIV. Services are based on a treatment plan, conducted in an outpatient group or individual session, and provided by a mental health professional licensed or authorized within the state to render such services. Such professionals typically include psychiatrists, psychologists, and licensed clinical social workers.

Program Guidance: Mental Health Services are allowable only for people with HIV who are eligible to receive HRSA Ryan White HIV/AIDS Program services.

Universal Standards: All subrecipients must meet [universal standards](#) requirements in addition to service area standards for which they are funded.

3: Assessments, Referrals, and Linkages	<p>3.1. Clients are referred, as appropriate, to medical case management; client is asked to sign release of information (ROI), if needed, to coordinate services with case manager as indicated.</p> <p>3.2. Clients are referred, as appropriate, to psychiatric, higher intensity psychological or substance abuse treatment services; client is asked to sign release of information (ROI), if needed, to coordinate services with other behavioral health services as indicated.</p> <p>3.3. Providers of mental health services coordinate care with clients' primary care physician or HIV medical doctor with the following guidelines:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> a. Consent in the form of a signed release of information (ROI) if needed, by the client. b. Signed documentation that the client does not consent to coordinated care between their Ryan White mental health provider and their HIV primary care physician. 	<p>3.1-3.3 Client record has dated, signed documentation of coordination of service activities and, if appropriate, ROI.</p> <p>3.3. Client record has dated and signed documentation of coordination of care with primary care or HIV physician updated annually.</p> <p>3.3. Client record has dated and signed documentation that indicates that the client does not consent to coordinated care between their Ryan White mental health provider and their HIV primary care physician. To be updated annually.</p>

4: Provider Qualifications	<p>4.1 All clinical mental health services are provided by a licensed mental health professional who is Medical Assistance (MA) qualified.</p> <p>4.2. All clinical mental health services are provided by one of the following:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Licensed mental health professional in the state of Minnesota • An individual certified by a tribal council as a mental health professional, serving a federally recognized tribe • Mental health practitioners who qualify as clinical trainees <p>4.3 Clinical mental health programs may provide additional client support and administrative assistance by staff with knowledge of HIV and skills and experience to provide psychosocial support to clients, coordinated with clinical mental health services.</p>	<p>4.1-4.2. Program file contains copies of current licensure and Minnesota Health Care Programs Provider Agreement.</p> <p>4.1-4.2. If a clinical trainee provides service, program file contains a copy of the Qualified Mental Health Professional Clinical Supervisor Assurance Statement.</p> <p>4.3. Program file contains documentation of all current direct service staff qualifications including education, work experience, skills assessment, and relevant certification or licensure where applicable.</p>
